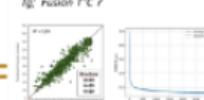

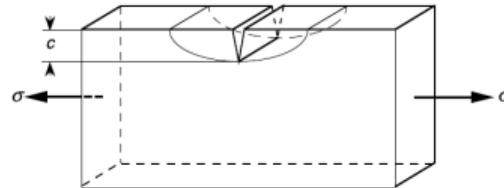


Figure 1: Tensile experiment on a sample with a size flaw  $c$ .

$$\sigma_c = \frac{\sqrt{2E\gamma}}{\sqrt{\pi c}}. \quad (1)$$

The fracture toughness is defined<sup>1</sup>:

$$K_{Ic} = \sqrt{2E\gamma}, \text{ in plane-stress,} \quad (2)$$

$$K_{Ic} = \sqrt{\frac{2E\gamma}{1 - \nu^2}}, \text{ in plane-strain.} \quad (3)$$

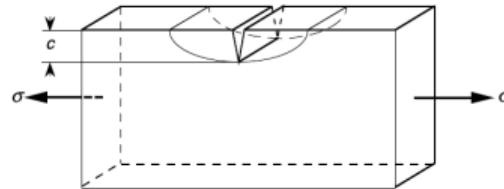


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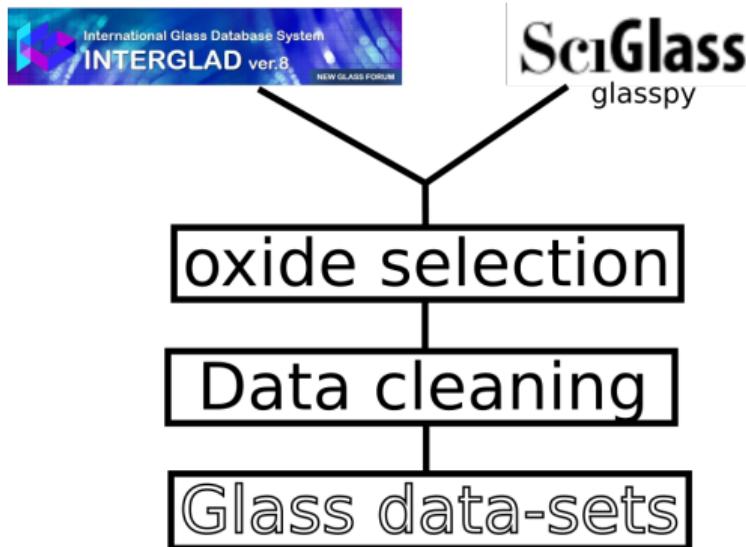

## 2. Deep learning method



- i) **network formers:**  $\text{SiO}_2$ ,  $\text{B}_2\text{O}_3$ ,  $\text{P}_2\text{O}_5$ ,  $\text{V}_2\text{O}_5$  and  $\text{GeO}_2$ ;
- ii) **network modifiers:**  $\text{Na}_2\text{O}$ ,  $\text{K}_2\text{O}$ ,  $\text{Li}_2\text{O}$ ,  $\text{CaO}$ ,  $\text{MgO}$ ,  $\text{SrO}$ ,  $\text{BaO}$ ,  $\text{Fe}_2\text{O}_3$ ,  $\text{Y}_2\text{O}_3$ ,  $\text{La}_2\text{O}_3$ ;
- iii) **network intermediates:**  $\text{Al}_2\text{O}_3$ ,  $\text{TiO}_2$ ,  $\text{ZrO}_2$ ,  $\text{ZnO}$  and  $\text{PbO}$ .
- ▶ keras of Python ➔ Artificial Neural Networks (ANN) with 2 or 3 hidden layers with 20 neurons.
- ▶ The Gaussian error linear units “gelu” activation function (hidden layers) and linear function for output layer.
- ▶ Adam solver used for the optimization.
- ▶ Variable to fit is normalized.
- ▶ Spitting of training, validation and test sub-sets is [0.6; 0.2, 0.2].

### 3. Density & molar volume

- ▶ According to Huggins<sup>2</sup> and Huggins and Sun<sup>3</sup> for a glass of  $N$  oxides  $\text{M}_{n_i}\text{O}_{m_i}$ :

$$\frac{1}{\rho} = \sum_{i=1}^N [(k + b_{\text{SiO}_2}) n_i + m_i c_i] \frac{y_i}{\mathcal{M}_i}, \quad (4)$$

- ▶ After changing  $y_i$  in  $x_i$ :

$$\mathcal{V}_{\mathcal{M}} = \sum_{i=1}^N [(k + b_{\text{SiO}_2}) n_i + m_i c_i] x_i. \quad (5)$$

### 3. Density & molar volume

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- ▶ After changing  $y_i$  in  $x_i$ :

$$\mathcal{V}_M = \sum_{i=1}^N [(k + b_{\text{SiO}_2}) n_i + m_i c_i] x_i. \quad (5)$$

**ANN model on  $\mathcal{V}_M$**

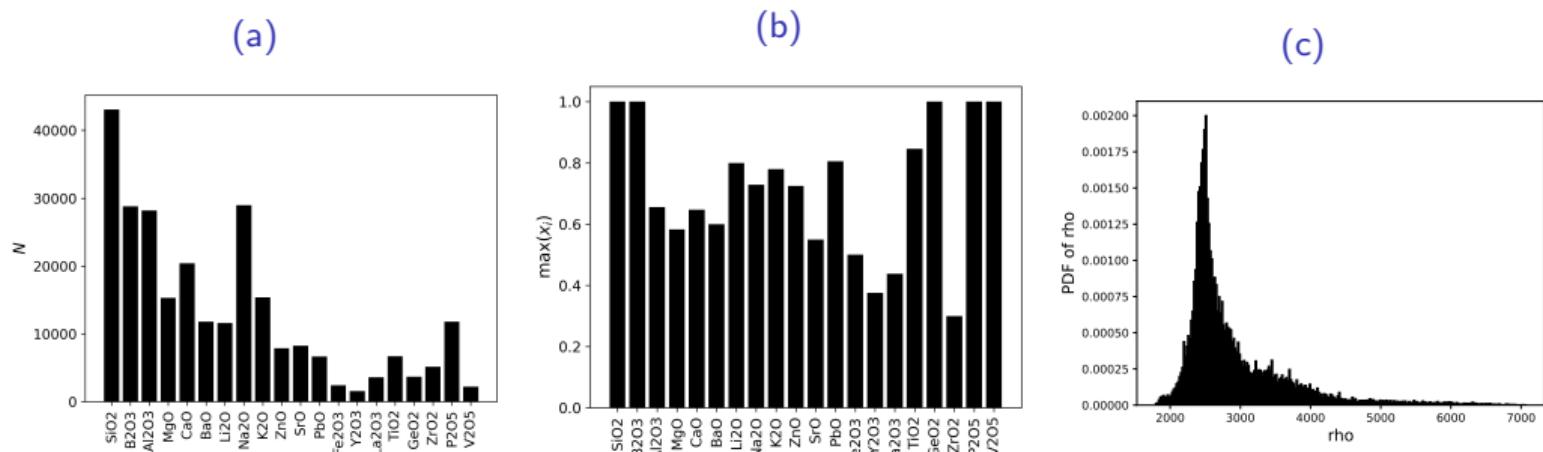


Figure 2: Histograms of (a) glasses and (b)  $\max(x_i)$  in the  $\rho$  data-set of 64 420 glasses, (c) pdf of  $\rho$  in kg/m<sup>3</sup>.

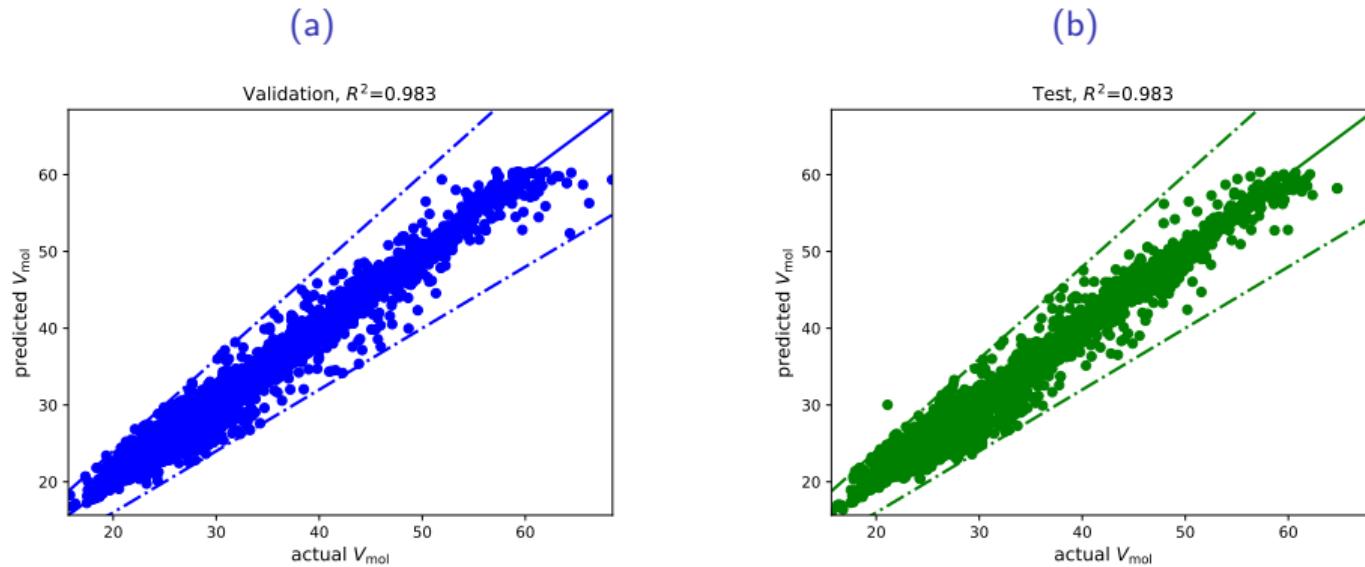


Figure 3: Predicted  $\mathcal{V}_M$  in ( $\text{cm}^3/\text{mol}$ ) as a function of data-set values for (a) the validation sub-set and (b) the test sub-set.

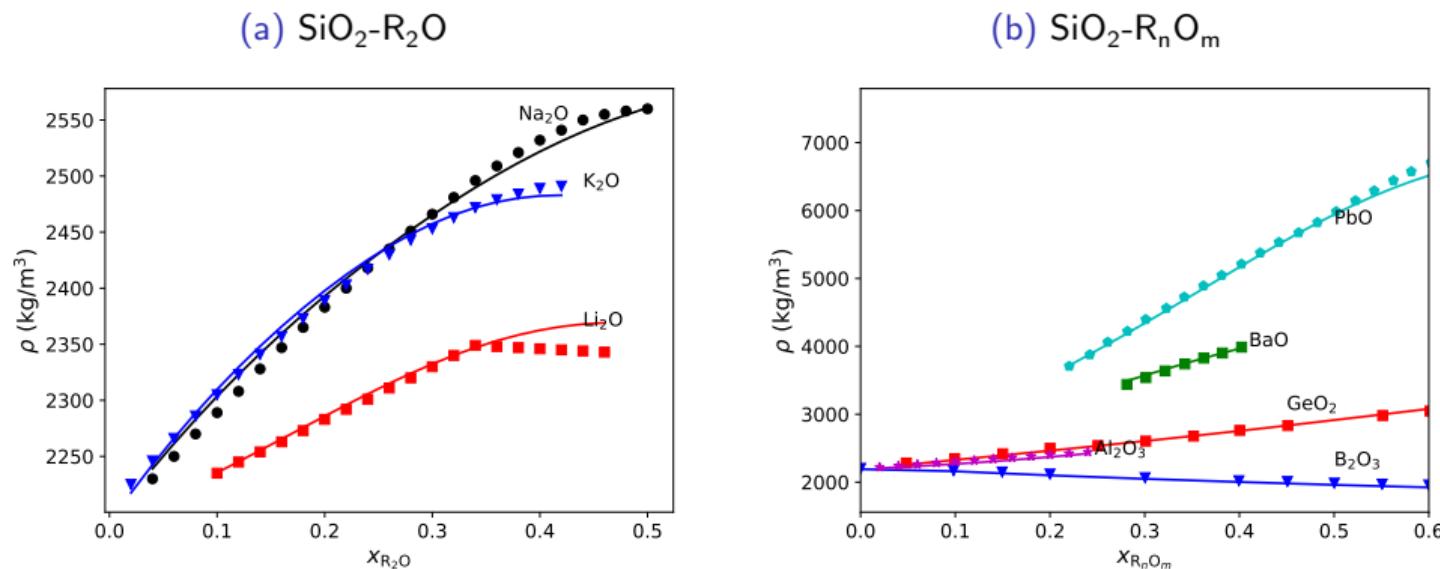


Figure 4:  $\rho$  ( $\text{kg}/\text{m}^3$ ) of (a) alkaline glasses and (b)  $\text{SiO}_2\text{-R}_n\text{O}_m$  glasses. Symbols are experimental data according to Bansal and Doremus<sup>4</sup>.

## 4. Young's modulus & packing factor

- ▶ According to Makishima & Mackenzie<sup>5</sup>,  $E$  is given by

$$E = 2V_t \mathcal{G}, \quad (6)$$

$$V_t = \frac{\sum_{i=1}^N V_i x_i}{\mathcal{V}_{\mathcal{M}}}, \quad (7)$$

$$\mathcal{G} = \sum_{i=1}^N G_i x_i. \quad (8)$$

- ▶  $G_i$  taken from data of Inaba et al.<sup>6</sup>.

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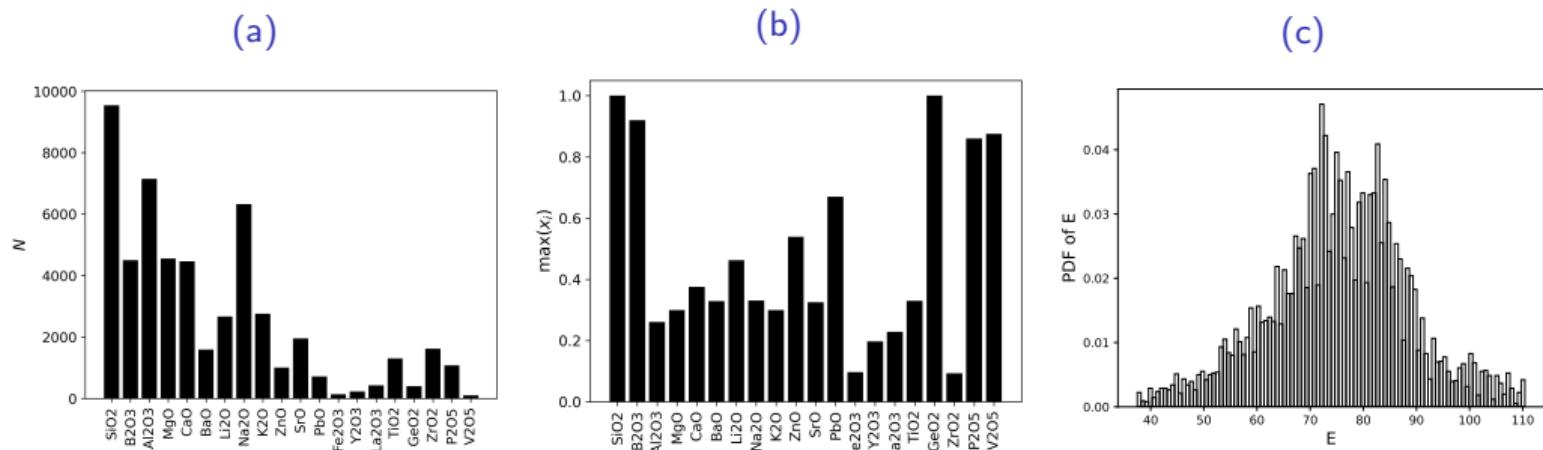


Figure 5: (a) number of glasses and (b)  $\max(x_i)$  in the data-set of  $E$  of 10 846 glasses, (c) pdf of  $E$  in GPa.

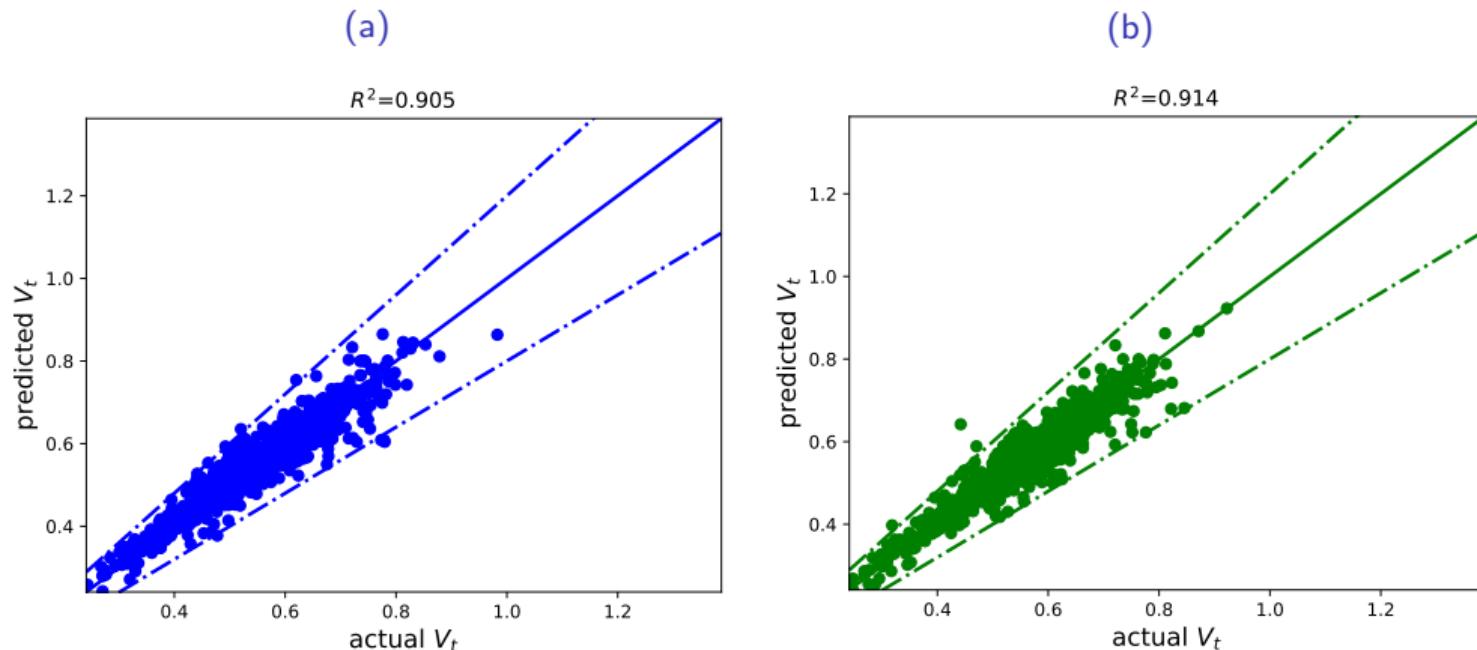


Figure 6: Predicted  $\mathcal{V}_t$  as a function of data-set values for the (a) validation sub-set and (b) test sub-set.

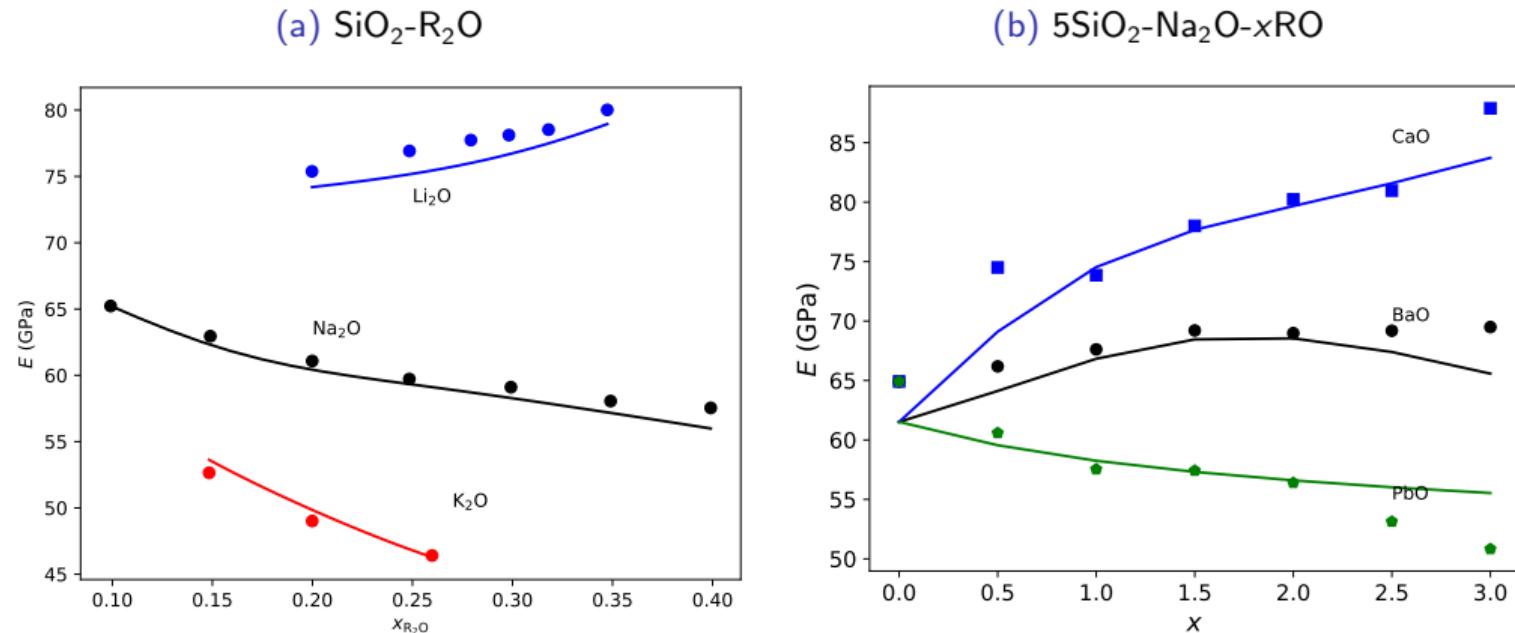


Figure 7:  $E$  in (a)  $\text{SiO}_2\text{-R}_2\text{O}$  and (b)  $5\text{SiO}_2\text{-Na}_2\text{O-}x\text{RO}$ . Data taken in<sup>7</sup>.

## 5. Poisson coefficient

- ▶ According to Makishima & Mackenzie<sup>8</sup>,  $\nu$  is given by

$$\nu = \frac{1}{2} - \frac{1}{6\alpha V_t}, \quad (9)$$

- ▶  $\alpha=1.2$  in Makishima & Mackenzie (1975).
- ▶ Rocherulle et al.<sup>9</sup> proposed  $\alpha=1.08$

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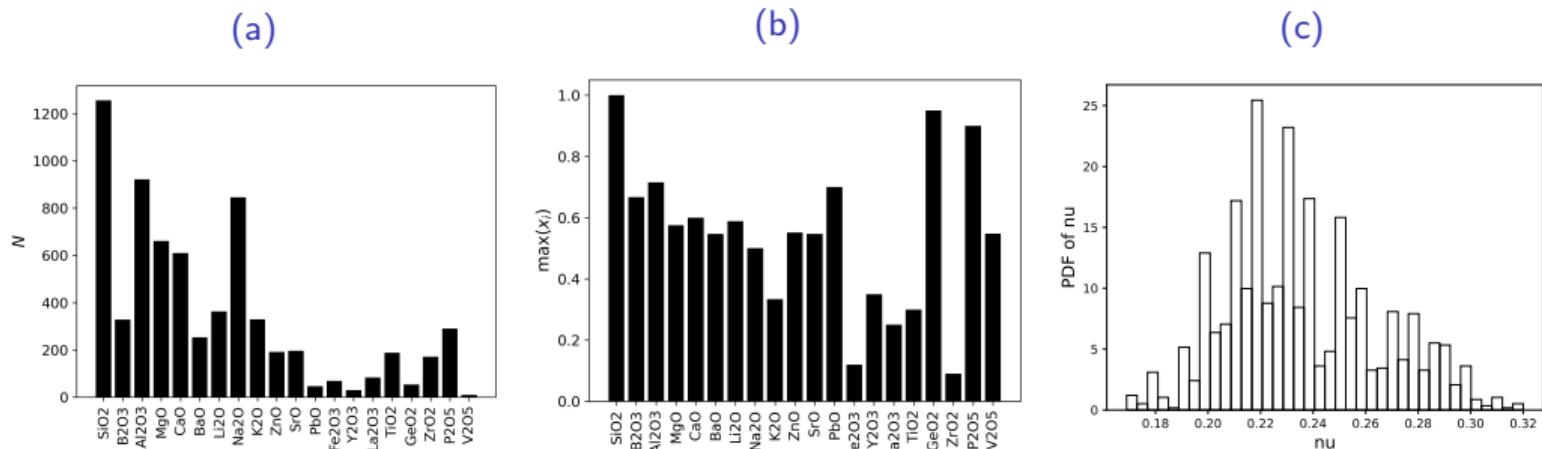
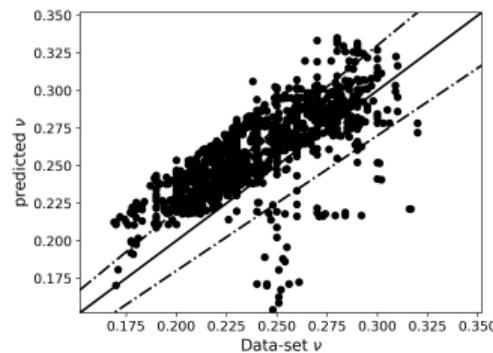


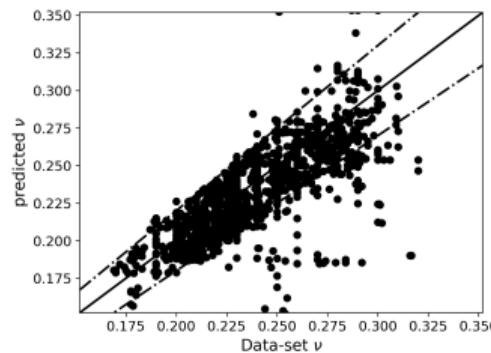
Figure 8: (a) number of glasses and (b)  $\max(x_i)$  in the data-set of  $\nu$  of 1464 glasses, (c) pdf of  $\nu$ .

(c)  $R^2=0.94$

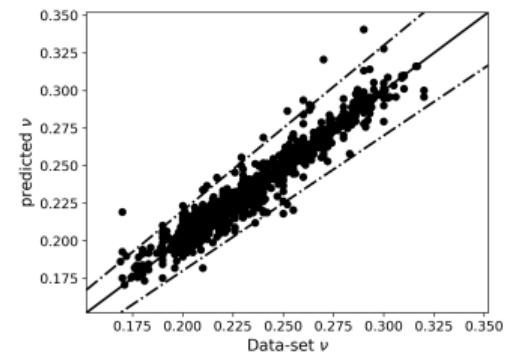
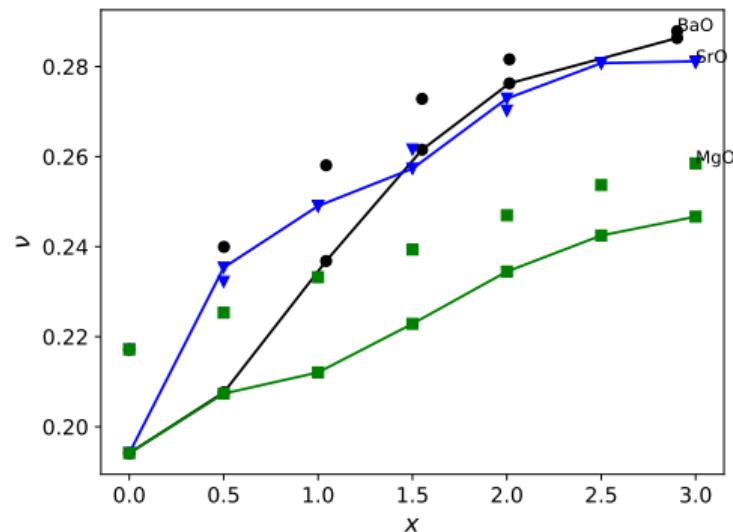


Figure 9: Comparison of the computation of  $\nu$  with the data-set for (a)  $\alpha=1.2$ , (b)  $\alpha=1.08$  (c)  $\alpha$  from ANN model.

(b) R=Zn & Ca

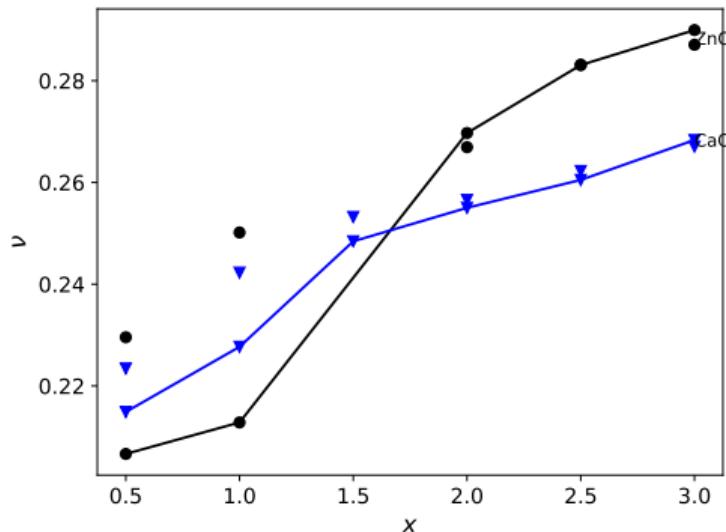


Figure 10:  $\nu$  in  $5\text{SiO}_2\text{-Na}_2\text{O-}x\text{R}\text{O}$ . Data taken in<sup>10</sup>.

## 6. Synthesis & perspectives

### Synthesis

- ▶ Creation of data-sets with a large amount of glasses (two databases have been used);
- ▶ Deep learning method applied to determine mechanical properties;
- ▶ Coupling with theoretical models enhances the accuracy of the prediction;
- ▶ Developments of model for  $T_m$  ( $\log(\eta)=1$ ),  $T_s$  ( $\log(\eta)=6.65$ ), and  $T_g$  ( $\log(\eta)=12$ ) ( $\eta$  in  $\text{Pa} \cdot \text{s}$ ).

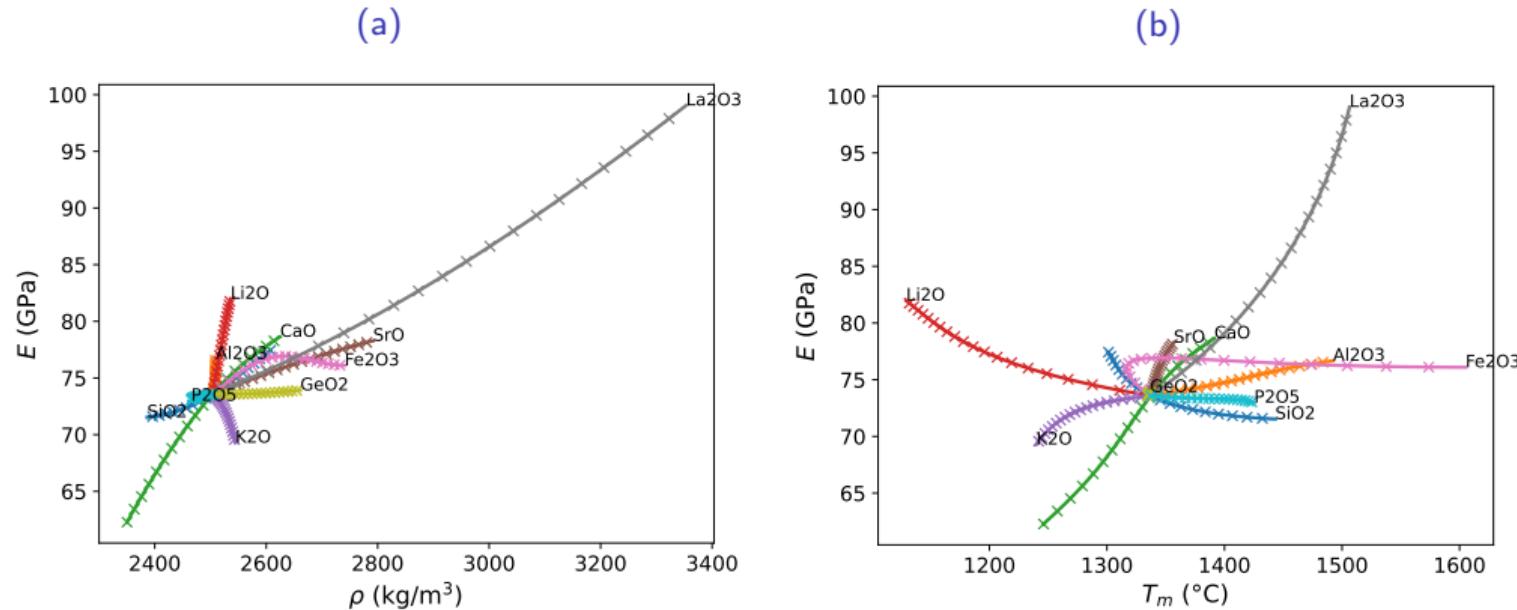


Figure 11: Spider-graph with a based composition (0.74SiO<sub>2</sub>-0.13Na<sub>2</sub>O-0.13CaO): (a)  $E$  vs.  $\rho$  and (b)  $E$  vs.  $T_m$ .

## 6. Synthesis & perspectives

### Perspectives

- ▶ Extend the work to  $K_{Ic}$  and  $\gamma$  the fracture surface energy;
- ▶ Determination of glass compositions based on genetic algorithm;
- ▶ Introduce probability aspect to determine prediction uncertainties.
